# (c) Authorization for Cleveland Metroparks Police Department to Enter into an Intergovernmental Cooperative/Mutual Aid Agreement

# **Background**

The City of Westlake, Hinckley Township and Cleveland Metroparks share a mutual concern to provide a safe and secure environment throughout the city, township and the Park District. Ohio Revised Code §1545.131 provides authority for a park district to enter into agreements with municipal corporations and townships to assist with police protection. The interagency agreements will delineate requests for assistance, Cleveland Metroparks responsibilities, the respective city and township responsibilities and other relevant terms.

(d) Lakefront Reservation: Authorization to Enter into Cooperative Agreement with Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District – Whiskey Island Connector Trail (Originating Sources: Rosalina M. Fini, Chief Legal & Ethics Officer/Kyle Baker, Sr. Assistant Legal Counsel/Sean McDermott, P.E., Chief Planning & Design Officer)

The Whiskey Island Connector Trail (WIC) is part of the group of trail projects funded through the federal Transportation Investment Generating Economic Recovery (TIGER) program. When complete, these transformative projects will invest more than \$16 million to complete  $\pm 4$  miles of paved all-purpose trail linking major focal points in the City of Cleveland with Lakefront Reservation and Lake Erie.

The 1.25 mile WIC will connect Edgewater Park to Wendy Park paralleling the very narrow Whiskey Island Drive corridor. Years of planning, negotiation, and collaboration have taken part with many of the project stakeholders and neighbors inclusive of the Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District (NEORSD), City of Cleveland, Port of Cleveland, Ohio Department of Natural Resources, and Norfolk Southern Railway.

NEORSD operates the Westerly Waste Water Treatment Plant (WWWTP) at the eastern border of Edgewater Park. The compact configuration of the WWWTP and the limited real estate available for typical trail development south of the plant has informed creative design and operational solutions in order to accomplish the construction of the WIC. Following years of positive and supportive discussions between Cleveland Metroparks and NEORSD on the WIC, the agencies have come to a cooperative agreement regarding short term and long term needs of the continued operation of their critical infrastructure and its relation to the WIC.

The basic tenets of the Cooperative Agreement with NEORSD for the WIC are:

- Cleveland Metroparks will construct a non-fixed (movable) truss bridge over NEORSD "Regulator W-01" which exists as a large concrete structure sitting immediately south of Whiskey Island Drive.
- Cleveland Metroparks will close the WIC and remove the non-fixed truss bridge structure when given notice that such temporary removal and closure is necessary in order for NEORSD to perform their infrequent maintenance of Regulator W-01.
- NEORSD plans to construct the Westerly Chemically Enhanced High Rate Treatment (WCEHRT) project in the future.
- During construction of the WCEHRT, NEORSD will install a water main that otherwise would have been constructed by Cleveland Metroparks as part of the WIC project. Cleveland Metroparks will reimburse NEORSD for actual costs of the water main installation. It is estimated that the maximum cost of this water main construction is \$100,000.

# **ACTION ITEMS** (cont.)

• In order to avoid future impact to the WIC during the WCEHRT construction, Cleveland Metroparks will install fiberoptic conduits for future use by NEORSD and such costs for those conduits will be deducted from the value of the water main installation performed by NEORSD.

- Cooperation between NEORSD and Cleveland Metroparks during construction of WCHERT will be provided as winter-time roadway closures of Whiskey Island Drive will be necessary.
- Cooperation between NEORSD and Cleveland Metroparks on determining the location of a new driveway to the WWWTP from Whiskey Island Drive and its relationship to the WIC. NEORSD will be responsible for any costs related to the reconstruction of the WIC relative to the driveway construction.
- NEORSD will consent to the existence of the WIC over areas where NEORSD
  has previously secured an easement from Norfolk Southern Railroad for their
  own non-exclusive use for Regulator W-01. Cleveland Metroparks easement
  from Norfolk Southern will overlap NEORSD's easement and thus require
  NEORSD consent.

## Background

The federal Department of Transportation has announced a highly competitive discretionary grant program for national infrastructure investments that have a significant impact on a metropolitan area or region. The Better Utilizing Investments to Leverage

Development (BUILD) grant program was previously known as the Transportation Investment Generating Economic Recovery (TIGER) grant program. Cumulatively, the BUILD/TIGER program has awarded \$7.9 billion to 609 surface transportation projects since 2009, including many with multimodal components.

Cleveland Metroparks received \$7.95 million in the TIGER VIII round in 2016 for its *Re-Connecting Cleveland: Pathways to Opportunity* application, submitted in partnership with The Trust for Public Land and L.A.N.D. studio, Inc. The TIGER award, along with additional federal and state grants as well as philanthropic support, has enabled construction of five trail projects: the Cleveland Lakefront Bikeway Connector and Canal Basin Park Connector projects that were completed in August 2019, and the Wendy Park Bridge, Whiskey Island Connector, and Red Line Greenway, which are projected to be complete in March 2021.

The 2020 BUILD application cycle will fund at least \$15 million of the \$1 billion available on projects for planning and preconstruction activities, including engineering and design; planning funds were last awarded under the TIGER VI round in 2014. Evaluation criteria include safety, economic competitiveness, quality of life, environmental sustainability, state of good repair, innovation, and partnership. Successful applicants will be announced by September 15, 2020, and projects must be under contract by the statutory deadline of September 30, 2022 and all funds must be expended by September 2027.

Cleveland Metroparks has been working with partners including the City of Cleveland, Cuyahoga County Planning Commission, Cuyahoga County Department of Public Works, and the Northeast Ohio Areawide Coordinating Agency (NOACA) to develop a

BUILD planning grant application to advance several of the 69 regionally significant trails and bikeway projects identified through the Cuyahoga Greenways Plan that was completed in 2019 and available at <a href="www.cuyahogagreenways.org">www.cuyahogagreenways.org</a>. Several projects have been designated as candidates for feasibility-level planning studies, while others will be fully engineered and designed.

As currently proposed, the federal BUILD grant program will fund the performance of planning and/or engineering activities for some or all of the three project groupings shown in the table below and depicted in map form on pages <u>91342</u> to <u>91343</u>. The total federal BUILD funding request will not exceed \$3,000,000 in federal grant funds, requiring \$750,000 in matching funds, for total costs of \$3,750,000. The final funding request, including the number of projects and respective levels of development, will be determined based on the amount of local matching funds assembled through the partnership to meet the required minimum 20 percent local share. Additional funds will also be sought for local match through other non-federal grant programs and/or private sources.

(f) Award of RFQu #6492 – Cleveland Harbor Eastern Embayment Resilience Study (CHEERS) Professional Design Services – Lakefront Reservation

# **Background**

Cleveland Metroparks and project partners, the City of Cleveland, Ohio Department of Natural Resources, Ohio Department of Transportation, and Port of Cleveland, are embarking the Cleveland Harbor Eastern Embayment Resilience Study (CHEERS). The study area extends from Burke Lakefront Airport east to the Cleveland Lakefront Nature Preserve (approximately two miles) and from the existing federal breakwall in Lake Erie south to St. Clair Avenue (approximately one mile). Cleveland Metroparks serves as project manager for the effort.

The \$251,000 project budget includes \$126,000 (split evenly) from project partners and a \$125,000 Coastal Resilience grant from the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation (NFWF). A Board Info Item about the project was presented in February 2020, followed by an Action Item for the contract with NFWF in March 2020.

# **RFQu Response and Analysis**

Cleveland Metroparks issued a Request for Qualifications (RFQu #6492) for Professional Design Services on February 3, 2020. Twelve (12) multidisciplinary teams submitted responses, providing a competitive field of prominent local and national engineering and design firms. A panel with representatives from each of the five CHEERS partner agencies reviewed the submittals and identified the four (4) teams deemed most qualified. The four teams were invited to participate in shortlist interviews which were held virtually on March 19, 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Pursuant to ORC 153.69, the project partners evaluated and ranked each team based on criteria from the RFQu: lead firm and project manager, strength of staff and team members, prior project experience, project approach, and responsiveness. The WRT team (WRT), which includes KS Associates and Great Ecology, was deemed by the five project partners as most qualified and the top ranked team overall. Subsequently, a Request for Proposal (RFP) was submitted to WRT which mirrored the scope outlined in the original RFQu.

# **Proposal Analysis**

WRT's Scope of Work will fulfill the terms of the RFQu and the NFWF grant. Their team will provide a general framework plan for the area, with a focus on opportunities along the shoreline and into Lake Erie. Local agencies, community organizations, and residents will be engaged throughout the planning process. The plan will explore actions to improve aquatic and terrestrial habitat, protect existing infrastructure, including Interstate 90, and expand neighborhood access and recreational opportunities along the lakefront. The work will propose options for the beneficial re-use of dredge material to help meet project goals and make progress towards technical design to position CHEERS for implementation. The proposed cost of \$251,000 will accomplish the scope of work below:

The requested commodity adjustment pays current invoices and anticipates remaining orders through May 31, 2020.

# RFP #6488 SUMMARY: CLEVELAND METROPARKS INVASIVE PLANT CONTROL

# **Background**

Cleveland Metroparks has dedicated funding from several sources for habitat improvement and invasive plant control at eighteen (18) high-priority restoration sites at the following reservations:

- 1. Acacia Reservation, WRRSP (Fund 2015308) in the sum of \$47,000, and Acacia Restoration Fund (2015509) in the sum of \$50,000;
- 2. Big Creek Reservation, Other Wetland Mitigation (2015444) in the sum of \$37,000;
- 3. Euclid Creek Reservation, Clean Ohio Land Acquisition Expense (4011030-576002) in the sum of \$50,000; and,
- 4. South Chagrin Reservation, Clean Ohio Land Acquisition Expense (4011030-576002) in the sum of \$50,000.

Cleveland Metroparks sought proposals from vendors with considerable expertise in managing the selective removal of multiple plant species, across diverse habitats, and multiple sites within the same field season. The projects at four (4) reservations were aggregated into one proposal in order to attract competitive proposals from a larger pool of suitable vendors.

Cleveland Metroparks seeks to enter into a two (2) year contract beginning on June 1, 2020 through May 31, 2022, with an option to renew for up to two (2) additional one (1) year terms at Cleveland Metroparks' sole discretion.

# **Evaluation**

Cleveland Metroparks issued RFP #6488 seeking proposals for a two (2) year contract with up to two (2) additional one (1) year terms from a vendor (or vendors) who has considerable experience in selective invasive plant control in natural areas. In reviewing the submitted proposals, Cleveland Metroparks staff considered the following criteria:

- general approach to invasive plant management based upon Cleveland Metroparks' stated objectives;
- description of control technique(s) or application method(s) for the primary target species;
- specification of herbicide(s) and tank mixes to be used;
- plan for mitigation or prevention of off-target damage;
- plan or recommendation for disposition of target biomass; and,
- plan or recommendation for follow-up management.

Based upon the above criteria, Cleveland Metroparks staff recommends Ecological Field Services LLC, as the vendor of choice for Cleveland Metroparks Invasive Plant Control. Reasons for selecting Ecological Field Services LLC, include but are not limited to the following:

- the management synopses demonstrated a thorough understanding of the technical complexity and nuance needed for successful natural area stewardship;
- the selective equipment and treatment methods best suit the ecological conditions and sensitivity of the project sites;
- proposed staffing and work schedules were consistent and appropriate for the project tasks; and,
- the cost structure was clear, consistent with staff expectations, well-justified, and generally the overall best and lowest cost.

Ecological Field Services LLC, also met the criteria set forth in the request for proposals:

25%	Previous experience with similar projects, knowledge and record of performance, and capacity to deploy sufficient personnel for the project sites.
25%	Qualifications of crew leaders, including prior experience with the primary targets, plant identification, or treatments around planted trees.

25%	The proposed pricing for services. Cleveland Metroparks reserves the right to negotiate the fee quotation during the interview/selection process.

That the Board authorize the Chief Executive Officer to enter into an agreement, in a form approved by the Chief Legal & Ethics Officer, between Cleveland Metroparks and **Ecological Field Services LLC**, in an amount not to exceed \$156,965 for its lowest and best proposal, as summarized above and maintained in the proposal file for RFP #6488, to conduct Cleveland Metroparks Invasive Plant Management, for a two (2) year contract from June 1, 2020 through May 31, 2022, with an option to renew for up to two (2) additional one (1) year terms.

Pursuant to Cleveland Metroparks By-Laws, Article 5 (Procurement), Section 4 (b) and (c), "...the CEO is not authorized to enter into any change orders to construction contracts, without prior approval of the Board in each instance, except that the CEO is authorized to enter into change orders to construction contracts, without prior approval of the Board in each instance, where the additional cost is less than THE LESSER OF: (i) \$50,000, or (ii) ten percent (10%) of the cost of the contract. Each change order by the CEO under this Article shall be reported to the Board at the next meeting of the Board following the execution of said change order."

# (b) Potential Projects for Accelerated Implementation

(Originating Sources: Sean E. McDermott, P.E., Chief Planning & Design Officer/Sara Byrnes Maier, Senior Strategic Park Planner)

In response to the economic strain of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, the federal government has recently passed three coronavirus relief bills and is in discussions for more. Should a bill be enacted similar to the February 2009 infrastructure and jobs focused American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA), signed into law in response to the start of the Great Recession and following passage of the Troubled Asset Relief Program (TARP) in October 2008, Cleveland Metroparks has developed a list of capital projects that could quickly be moved to construction. Staff will provide an overview of "shovel-ready projects" that may be good candidates for a federal infrastructure stimulus program, should one be passed.

Due to technical difficulties with the videoconference, the last two information/briefing/policy items listed on the agenda, *Slavic Village Downtown Connector Trail Project* and *2019 Park District Visitation Results*, were deferred to a later meeting date.
