Mandel Community Trail – E.9th - E.55th



Late summer 2026 project completion

\$10.8 M construction contract Funding from Jack, Joseph, and Morton Mandel Foundation, NOACA, Cleveland, and Cuyahoga County

- Cuyahoga County Public Works is managing construction
- Roadway is open to two-way traffic.
- Conduit and light pole foundations are under construction (north side of road)
- Portion of Shoreline Apartment pavement removed; curb wall is being installed for the trail / new parking configuration
- Traffic control will remain active
- Paving is in place from SR 2 interchange to E55th

Completion is on schedule for Memorial Day 2026

- Building will be under roof and weather tight in a few weeks
- Structural steel installation continues
- Second floor concrete slabs are underway
- Exterior framing is in progress; sheathing to begin in next week or two

Jack, Joseph, and Morton Mandel Boathouse West Building



Completion is on schedule for Memorial Day 2026

- Foundation work and underground utilities are complete
- Concrete floor slab will be poured very soon
- Pre-engineered metal building system to be delivered in November; vertical construction to begin shortly thereafter










Gordon Park South - 2024 Planning Process

- Construction March 2026
 - Additional site demolition and restoration
 - Construction of Phase I improvements
 - Restroom / comfort station
 - Park infrastructure including utilities, parking, paths, and road improvements
 - Picnic areas with barbeque grills
 - Signage, lighting, benches, and picnic tables
 - Picnic shelter
 - Tree planting and habitat areas
 - Great Lawn and Promenade (main loop trail)
 - Playground

CHEERS

Cleveland Harbor Eastern Embayment Resilience Strategy

- In-water design fully funded; currently at 60% milestone and being coordinate with USACE on a bi-weekly basis
- Potentially USACE's preferred alternative for the 20-year Cleveland Harbor Dredge Material Management Plan (DMMP) and possible costsharing agreement
- Habitat Loop Early Action Project design will be shovelready in early 2026
- Monthly meetings with 6 main partners + key stakeholders
- Quarterly stakeholder meetings incl. 50 organizations




CHEERS Habitat Loop Early Action Project

Executive Summary

CHEERS is a cost-effective, long-term investment in Cleveland's community and economy. For every dollar invested in CHEERS, the project is projected to generate \$3.10 in benefits in return.*

CHEERS Reconnecting Communities Institute Technical Assistance

- City of Cleveland, ODOT, St. Clair Superior, Cleveland Metroparks, and NOACA participated in a federal program to improve bike and pedestrian connections to the lakefront
- NOACA submitted the 2024 grant application
- While the grant was not successful, CHEERS was invited to participate in the technical assistance available through RCI
- The E 55th corridor was identified as the priority focus area
- Transportation planning efforts to improve bicycle and pedestrian connections to the lakefront continue



CHEERS Workforce Development Plan

Goal: Ensure that the CHEERS project creates meaningful pathways to employment, particularly in neighboring communities.

- Identify workforce needs associated with the design, 20+ years of construction, and longterm stewardship of CHEERS, particularly in green infrastructure, marine construction, habitat restoration, and park operations.
- Assess existing training programs, identify gaps, and recommend strategies and partners to fill needed workforce gaps and connect underrepresented communities to emerging job opportunities.

Euclid Beach Connector Trail

- The Euclid Beach Connector Trail was identified as a priority during Cuyahoga County's 2021 Lakefront Public Access Plan
- When complete, this lakefront trail will link Euclid Beach to East 152nd Street while protecting the shoreline from additional erosion
- This Cuyahoga County-led effort has progressed through full design and permitting
- Funding is in place and construction will begin in early 2026
- Cleveland Metroparks will maintain the completed trail

Euclid Creek Lakefront Park Expansion

- 2021 Western Reserve Land
 Conservancy led the process to protect
 28.8 acres of lakefront property from development
- 2022 2023 A public planning process resulted in designation of the property as public parkland to improve lakefront access
- Sept. 2025 The property was transferred to Cleveland Metroparks
- Discussions are pending about a potential partnership with Cleveland Public Library's adjacent property and the desire to construct a replacement to the current Nottingham Branch
