

What is a Water Trail?

- A stretch of river, lake, or other waterway that has been identified and mapped as a trail
- Contains signage and facilities that enable access and address safety
- Designation by the Ohio Department of Natural Resources

Cuyahoga River Water Trail








The Cuyahoga River Ship Channel

Red Lines = Danger Zones, do not stop when freighter is in the area


Orange Lines = Passing Zones, least unsafe place to stop while freighter passes
