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

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

- Supporting and empowering communities through livelihood, food security, and education programs







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


Why capacity building?



Gorillas are guardians of their **forests**, which are some of our last **biodiversity-rich places** on earth and our best natural defenses against climate change.




Their forests **are critical "lungs" for our planet** — they absorb more carbon than anywhere else in the tropics, thus reducing Co2 buildup in the atmosphere and slowing global warming.



Preserving these forests is vital not just for the future of gorilla ecosystems and the human communities that live around them, but for the world.

This will require investments in strengthening scientific capacity, to center African biodiversity research in Africa.





- Common language and increased self-awareness


People who focus on their strengths are:


