Currently Do At The Lake


- Most of the activity is around the E 55th St Marina for fishing, North Gordon Park, and the Nature Preserve.
- Top activities include: Fishing, Bike/Scooter, Walking

Want To Do At The Lake

- What people want to see most at the lake is as much fishing as possible, better access from the neighborhoods, new or improvements to pedestrian bridges, and well lit trails and plenty of amenities within the park.
- Some of the proposed amenities or activities include: food truck pavilion, places for concerts / live music, renovate & reuse of old aquarium, land bridges, and viewsheds for a "photo-op" of the view

Excited To Do At The Lake

- People are most excited to have access and to have the opportunity to spend more time at the lakefront.
- Top projects or experiences people are looking forward to are: biking & walking trails, nature programs, kayaking (kayak rentals), having consistent public access.



Cultural and Environmental Assessments



✓ Section 106 Scoping Request

- o Status –SHPO Letter Received on February 28
- No further coordination for this portion of the permitting is required. In concurrence with our recommendation the proposed development will have no effect on historic properties.
 Substantial changes to the project design should be coordinated with SHPO.

✓ Level 1 Ecological Survey Report

- Status Submitted to USACE for review on March 31
- Based on potential fly ash, bottom ash, and boiler slag contamination or use as fill supporting the modern shoreline and the Lakefront Reservation and Fishing Area (Parcel# 105-35-001), a *Phase II ESA is recommended prior to soil disturbance on this parcel*. The point of origin of the potential contamination is the former Lake Shore Coal-Fired Power Plant.
- Excavation within 300-ft of the boundaries of the Gordon Park Landfill will require a Chapter
 513 Permit from the Ohio EPA. This limit affects the easternmost extent of the breakwater for the E. 72nd Street boat launch and the Intercity Yacht Club.










Delft3D-FLOW Model





Design Refinement Goals

Creating a plan that maintains and expands on the CHEERS resiliency vision





Reduce the cost by reducing the overall length of breakwater, while maintaining dredge fill capacity (20-years)



Address trash reduction, and consider overall park operations and maintenance



Expand ecology by creating diverse, siteappropriate terrestrial and aquatic habitats



Expand upon the priorities identified in the Masterplan for <u>programmatic</u> <u>opportunities</u>, and continue to develop and refine the park programs based on community outreach events



Reduce the risk of adverse affects to <u>water quality</u>, provide movement of water through the cove to address water quality concerns



Improve park access, links to the neighborhood and community, and expanded parking for new park amenities






